

Iran, Hamas military operations have shattered Israel's image of invincibility

TEHRAN- After the 1967 Arab-Israeli War, also known as the Six Day War, Israel has always tried to project an image of itself as a powerful entity with an invincible army.

However, the October 7 military operation carried out by the Palestinian resistance movement Hamas and Iran's recent missile and drone attacks against Israel have seriously challenged the regime's aura of invincibility.

Over 1,100 people were killed when Hamas conducted Operation Al-Agsa Flood in southern Israel and more than 250 others were taken captive. Dozens of the captives still remain in Gaza.

Soon after Hamas launched the surprise attack, Western media acknowledged that the operation exposed the Israeli military's fiasco.

Operation True Promise: Gaza must remain the focal point

BEIRUT-The most important aspect of Iran's retaliatory strike against the Israeli occupation entity on April 13th is the establishment of a new deterrence equation: If Iranian territory is attacked, the response will be inevitable and

A war with Iran is not going to happen

TEHRAN - If you are a committed Zionist who is deeply disturbed by Iran's attack on the occupied territories and Israel's lackluster response to it, you may be inclined to launch a new propaganda campaign to convince the West of the urgent "need" to confront Iran.

Raisi visit to Pakistan: an opportune moment for cementing cooperation

TEHRAN - In a significant milestone in the diplomatic relations between the neighboring countries, Dr. Seyyed Ebrahim Raisi, the President of the Islamic Republic of Iran, accompanied by a high-level delegation of his important cabinet members and senior officers, is set to visit Pakistan from April 22-24, 2024 at the invitation of Muhammad Shehbaz Sharif, the Prime Minister of Islamic Republic of Pakistan.

Iranian President to visit Pakistan, Sri Lanka

U.S. awards Israelis \$26bn for Gaza genocide

Iran is victorious in the field

In the following column, we take a look at some important contents and views in yesterday's Iranian newspapers.

In a commentary, Hamshahri discussed the change of approach in the Iran-Israel conflict and wrote: Although about a week has passed since the implementation of the True Promise operation, the investigation of the various angles of this operation and the consequences and developments resulting from it are still at the top of the analyses of international think tanks. It is an operation that observers consider to be a crossing of long-term patterns between Tehran and Tel Aviv. In the first encounter with the shock caused by Iran's drones and missiles attack on some military targets in the occupied territories, the decision-makers in Washington and Tel Aviv put the approach of "achievementmanufacturing" on the agenda and tried to make Tel Aviv look successful in "repelling Iran's attack" and show it as a victorious on the field but the point here is that the True Promise operation while stabilizing Iran's deterrence power showed Iran's strategic power in the region. According to Susan Maloney, Vice President of the Brookings Institution and Director of the Foreign Policy Program, the Middle East seems to have been freed from an important danger, and after Iran's dronemissile attack on Israel, Washington hopes that peace will be established in the conflict between Tehran and Tel Aviv.

Iran: Collapse of the fake hegemony

In an analysis, the Iran newspaper discussed the collapse of the fake regime's hegemony and said: The Zionist regime tried to respond to the True Promise operation which destroyed the fake hegemony of this regime by attacking one of Iran's military bases.

But Amir Abdollahian described this attack as follows: "The flight of two or three quadcopters in Isfahan is like a toy that our children use in Iran." Despite the efforts of the Western media circles to exaggerate the Israeli attack in Isfahan, the timely interception of the Iranian military base's anti-aircraft defense has left nothing but silence and anger for the Israeli authorities. This means that Iran's upper hand in the "field" can make Tel Aviv the definite loser of any possible conflict.

Therefore, when the American network ABC News quoted an American official and claimed that Israeli missiles had hit a center in Iran, no reliable media confirmed this news. Even Ben Gvir, the minister of internal security of the Zionist regime, simply preferred to react to the recent events by saying, "The Iranians are mocking us after this action".

Ham Mihan: The policies of Iran and Turkey should complement each other

Ham Mihan dedicated its headline to the policies of Tehran and Ankara regarding Palestine and wrote: Hadi Borhani, an analyst of Israeli issues, said in a conversation with this newspaper that Turkey's active support for the Palestinians is defined in the financial, political, and international fields. What Turkey does not want to interfere is military issues. Financial aid is also done as much as possible so that it does not harm Ankara's interactions and relations with other countries. If we look at the geopolitics of the region, we realize that Iran and Turkey are important countries in the Palestinian issue. However, the roles of Tehran and Ankara in this field are different. Iran is very active in the field of supporting Palestinian militant groups in the military dimension, and Turkey supports the Palestinians politically, internationally and to some extent financially. The role of these two countries can complement each other and if coordination between Tehran and Ankara happens, it will ultimately benefit the Palestinians. If the understanding spreads in the two countries that the two sides complement each other, something positive will happen in the Palestinian issue.

Etemad: Trying to change the phase from the field to diplomacy

In a conversation with Ali Bigdeli, an expert on international affairs, Etemad dealt with the entry of new actors, including Egypt and Jordan, into indirect negotiations between Iran and Israel. The paper said: The best way in any equation in the field of foreign policy is negotiation and dialogue. This path can reduce the anger between Iran and Israel and even America. Iranian Foreign Minister Amir Abdollahian's visit to New York and his unannounced meeting with Egypt's Foreign Minister indicate that Egypt is acting as a mediator in this crisis. Even some European officials secretly changed this situation with secret diplomacy so that Israel would not take unconventional action. The situation that was formed after Iran's attack on Israel is the result of the efforts made in the diplomatic channel. This is the right thing to do. It seems that part of our differences with Israel has ended for now. However, Israel's enmity will not end and may continue to hit Iran's regional arms. This is a separate discussion, but the differences and conflicts between Iran and Israel have been reduced to a great extent as a result of diplomacy.

'Iran is trying to create a new normal in the region'

TEHRAN- An analyst affiliated with the Atlantic Council think tank, stating that Iran has created a new normal in the region with its direct attack on Israel, called for the management of the situation by the United States.

William F. Wechsler, an analyst at the Atlantic Council, in assessing the regional developments, stated that as Iran carefully considered how and where to respond to Israel's attack in Damascus, the United States and Israel must take action to manage the situation after Iran's response.

He believes that Tehran's goal was clearly to prevent Israel from targeting its diplomatic facilities again, as they were safe places for diplomats and experts to use.

Wechsler stated, "Iran, through its attack, operationally sent an undeniable message that it does not want to escalate the situation further and ignite a real war in the region. With this goal in mind, Tehran chose long-range attacks that were defensible and emphasized in its messages for the United States to stay out of the issue."

The American think tank report claimed that the current situation has ended in Iran's favor after October 7. In the current regional circumstances, Iran's nuclear program has moved out of the spotlight, continues to progress unhindered, and has even crossed points that were previously deemed unacceptable. In addition, Iran has so far prevented any real threat to Hezbollah, which serves as a bulwark against Israel's attack on its nuclear infrastructure.

He added that Iran has created a new precedent by directly attacking Israel, and is now capable of doing so directly from Iranian soil. Therefore,

Iran has created a key point, something it has gradually strengthened over the decades.

The report emphasized that Iran has normalized its assistance to its proxies, as it has been doing in Yemen for some time, and has gained new capabilities through Yemen's Ansarullah movement to close the Bab al-Mandab Strait whenever it wants. Tehran has also demonstrated its ability to threaten Israelis through Hezbollah in Lebanon.

The writer of the report stressed that Tehran has successfully created a norm and precedent in terms of directly attacking Israelis, which could be valuable for Iran if it acquires nuclear weapons. Furthermore, Iran has shown both the limitations of the United States and its own reliable capabilities. While Washington has been committed to Israel's security for decades, the direct threat to Israel now comes without a military response from the United States.

In another part of the report, it is mentioned that Iran's recent actions have alerted the Arab states in the Persian Gulf not to rely on the unreliable and ineffective security umbrella of the

The Atlantic Council expert concluded by stating that "Iran's goals were rational and calculated, and Tehran played with an understanding of its strengths and the weaknesses of its adversaries."

He called for Israel and the United States not to allow Iran to achieve the aforementioned goals, instead Washington should let Israel take action against Hamas, pursue the normalization process, and change the region's geopolitics

Decisions made by this committee are legally binding on all governmental, non-governmental, and military entities.

While this failure may have eased tensions for Western states trying to avoid a war with Iran, it served as a wake-up call for Zionists as it made them realize that Israeli threats against Iran have been a bravado all along. Even worse, Iran's new conditions for the regime have signaled an end to the "Death by a thousand cuts" strategy, and Israel's newfound reliance on the West means the regime now has less room to act recklessly.

In an unprecedented situation like this, the only option left for Zionists is to come up with something new that would provoke the West into a conflagration with Iran. However, much to their dismay, it seems they are left with the

same good old narratives that are are unlikely to prove persuasive.

One of these attempts at finding new grounds for war with Iran could be seen on the Wall Street Journal on April 20. A longtime advocator of direct American strikes on Iran with deep links to AIPAC came hand in hand with an Iranian oppositionist to warn the West about a grim future in an article titled "Iran's nuclear Calculus has now become more dangerous".

The article contains remarkably fresh falsehoods, even when considering its source as Zionists. It draws a parallel between Tehran's alliances with regional resistance groups and Britain's colonial rule in West Asia. The authors, however, fail to explain how the British regime's history of violence, oppression, and exploitation in Arab nations equates to Iran's logistical backing of anti-colonial movements.

In a desperate attempt to blame everything on Iran, the article then miraculously condemns Iran for the Al-Aqsa Storm operation as well as the devastating effects of the war in Gaza. It argues that while Iran may have not "greenlighted" the October 7 Palestinian operation, it surely benefits from Israel's prolonged killing campaign in Gaza, while purposefully omitting Tehran's diplomatic endeavors to halt the violence in the besieged region over the last seven months.

The only thing the authors don't blame on Iran is Washington's vetos of the UN Security Council resolution advocating for peace in the war-stricken enclave.

TEHRAN – Iran has displayed the home-grown Mohajer 6 drone at a defense expo in the Iraqi capital Baghdad.

Upon the signing of a contract for the operation of a 400-kV BtB HVDC power transmission line between Khoy in Iran and Van in Turkey, it is possible to exchange electricity between the two countries with the most modern technologies, he noted.

He went on to say that the electricity exchange between the two neighbors will strengthen cooperation and economic development, adding that this provides diversification and reduces dependency on other energy sources.

Iran, Syria call for implementing joint industrial projects

TEHRAN - An Iranian delegation currently in Damascus has met with Syrian government officials to discuss the implementation process of joint industrial projects, with both sides emphasizing the need to boost economic cooperation, especially among private companies of the two countries.

Iranian Ambassador to Syria Hossein Akbari and his accompanying delegation met with Syrian officials such as Minister of Economy and Foreign Trade Mohammad Samer al-Khalil, Minister of Industries Abdul Qadir Jokhdar, and Fadi al-Khalil, the head of Syria's International Cooperation and Planning Organization, IRNA reported citing Al

Ekhbariya website.

Samer al-Khalil told the Iranian delegation that joint investment projects are an important opportunity to realize the common interests of the two countries and a way to encourage Syrian companies to cooperate with Iranian companies that have scientific and practical experience as well as excellent facilities.

Abdul Qadir Jokhdar informed that the meeting focused on joint projects related to the production of tires, tractors, and milk powder, which was previously discussed by Syrian Prime Minister Hossein Arnous during his trip to Tehran.

2,000 worn-out taxis to be replaced with EVs in Tehran

TEHRAN - Municipal authorities in Tehran have decided to replace 2,000 worn-out taxis with electric vehicles (EVs).

Shadi Maleki, the caretaker of the Taxi Organization of Tehran, said on Saturday that the measure takes place as part of plans to renovate the city's transportation fleet to help improve air quality.

She said that based on an agreement between the Taxi Organization of Tehran and Modiran Vehicle Manufacturing Company, owners of taxis older than 10 years can register for a supportive package to receive EVs in exchange for their taxis.

Some 27,500 taxis, as well as 5,000 vans, are scheduled to join Tehran's transportation fleet this year, the official said, adding that some 10,000 electric taxis will be supplied to the applicants in the first phase.

The head of Modiran Vehicle Manufacturing Company has also said that an agreement has been signed for the supply of 2,000 cars. He noted that in the first phase, the company will supply 1,000 vehicles.

Tehran, Doha to ink new contracts in energy sector

TEHRAN - Iran and Qatar plan to ink new contracts in the near future to boost bilateral ties in the energy sector, an official with Iran's Ministry of Energy said.

Connecting the electricity grids of Iran and Qatar is one of the main measures taken for the development of the electricity cooperation, Mojtaba Akbari, the director of Iran's Ministry of Energy for International Affairs said.

Annual agro-food exports increase over 22%

TEHRAN – The value of Iran's exports of agricultural and foodstuff products increased by 22.5 percent in the previous Iranian calendar year (ended on March 19), the spokesman of the International Relations and Trade Development Committee of Iran's House of Industry, Mining and Trade said.

According to Ruhollah Latifi, Iranian producers managed to export about \$6.3 billion worth of the mentioned products in the said year, IRNA reported.

As reported, agro-food products accounted for 12.8 percent of the country's total non-oil exports in the previous year.

Iraq was the top destination for Iran's agro-food products in the mentioned year importing \$1.986 billion worth of the said items. The Arab neighbor accounted for 31.5 percent of the total exports of food and agricultural products from Iran.

The United Arab Emirates (UAE) stood in second place, importing \$751 million of the mentioned products, followed by Russia with \$521.5 million.

The value of Iran's total foreign trade including oil and technical engineering services reached \$153.17.8 billion in the last Iranian calendar year.

According to the Head of the Islamic Republic of Iran Customs Administration (IRICA Mohammad Rezvanifar, the value of the Islamic Republic's trade with the partners in the previous year increased by

2.6 percent compared to the same period last year.

The official put the country's non-oil exports, excluding exports of electricity, crude oil, and technoengineering services, at 136.4 million tons worth \$49.33 billion which shows a 9.82 percent rise in terms of tonnage and an 8.87 percent decline in terms of value.

Iran exported \$35.87 billion of crude oil, \$370 million of electricity, and \$1.293 billion of technical engineering services in the mentioned year, according to Rezvanifar.

According to him, during this period, 48.8 million tons of petrochemical products worth \$19.4 billion were also exported, which shows a decrease of 11.32 percent and 28.59 percent in terms of weight and value, respectively.

During this period, liquefied natural gas with \$3.9 billion, liquefied propane with \$3.62 billion,

and bitumen-oil with \$2.19 billion were Iran's top exported items.

Iran's top export destination during this period was China with \$13.915 billion worth of imports from the Islamic Republic, followed by Iraq with \$9.215 billion, the UAE with over \$6.611 billion, Turkey with \$4.16 billion, and India with \$2.17 billion.

The official put the average customs value of each ton of exported goods at \$362 which has decreased by 17 percent compared to the preceding year.

During this period, 39 million tons of goods worth \$66.28 billion were also imported into the country, which shows an increase of 4.39 percent in terms of weight and 77.9 percent in terms of value, he said.

The country's top five sources of imports in the previous year were the UAE with \$20.782 billion, China with \$18.545 billion, Turkey with

\$7.541 billion, Germany with \$2.155 billion, and India with \$1.917 billion worth of imports.

Corn, mobile phones, and gold ingots were the top three imported items followed by soybeans, automobile parts, sunflower seeds, and safflower were the five main items imported by the Islamic Republic.

Rezvanifar said the average customs value of each ton of imported goods increased by \$5.16 and reached \$1.697.

Iran's trade with its neighbors also increased by 1.35 percent in the previous year to reach \$60.773 billion, according to Rezvanifar.

He put the weight of nonoil trade with the neighboring countries at 95.924 million tons in the said period, which was 2.45 percent less than the figure for the preceding year.

During the past year, Iran exported \$28.288 billion worth of goods to its neighbors, while importing commodities valued at \$32.485 billion.

Iran's exports to neighboring countries decreased by 9.51 percent in the mentioned year; while the imports from neighboring countries increased by 13.17 percent.

He named Iraq, the UAE, Turkey, Pakistan, and Afghanistan as the top importers of Iranian goods among the neighboring countries, and the UAE, Turkey, Russia, Oman, and Pakistan as the main sources of imports in the previous.

NIOC inks contract with local firm to collect seismic data in northwestern Iran

TEHRAN – The National Iranian Oil Company (NIOC) has signed a contract with domestic firm Neign Afaq Kish Energy Development Company (TENCO) to implement 2-dimensional and 3-dimensional seismic operations in the north and northwestern Iran over a two-year period.

The contract was signed between the Head of the NIOC Directorate of Exploration Mehdi Fakour, and TENCO Head Abdolrasoul Aghajani on Tuesday, April 16, Shana reported.

The contract covers an area spanning 900 square kilometers and 1550 square kilometers respectively to collect 3-dimensional and 2-dimensional seismic data in Moughan region in the northwest of the country.

Based on the contract, 15 million euros and 10 trillion rials (about \$ 20 million), will be spent to carry out the operations that finally will lead to the clarification of the oil and gas exploratory situation in the region.

At the signing ceremony of the contract, TENCO's managing director thanked the NICO's Directorate of Exploration for concluding the contract, saying the two sides have been working with each other for fifteen years to help the oil industry as far as it concerns making progress and providing services.

"We hope that the completion of this project will be another step in the direction of attaining our mutual goal which is the oil industry prosperity," he added.

Nearly 200 days into the war, the regime of Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has failed to achieve "total victory" over Hamas and "destroy" it.

Netanyahu has tried to paper over the regime's vulnerability and weakness in the face of the Palestinian resistance by vowing to continue the war until eliminating Hamas.

Endless Hamas

Since October 7, Israeli military chief Herzi Halevi has generally spoken of "dismantling" rather than eliminating or eradicating Hamas, a term implicitly acknowledging that even a protracted war will not be able to destroy the resistance group.

Former Israeli air defense commander Brigadier General Zvika Haimovich: Iran is a superpower in tactical ballistic missiles and UAVs.

In mid-February, assessments by Israel's military intelligence showed that even if the regime dismantles Hamas's organized military capabilities, it will continue to operate in Gaza.

The assessments also indicated that "authentic support remains" for Hamas among Gazans.

In March, the U.S intelligence community said in its annual report that Israel will likely face Hamas resistance "for years to come".

Western officials have also acknowledged that Israel won't be able to overcome the Palestinian

The EU foreign policy chief said on February 18 that Israel needs a political, not a military, solution to the conflict with Palestinians.



Speaking during a panel discussion on the sidelines of the Munich Security Conference in Germany at that time, Josep Borrell warned that Israel cannot defeat Hamas through military means.

Israel has been starving Palestinians in the Gaza Strip and killed more than 34,000 people in the besieged territory but it has failed to achieve its military goals.

In the wake of the Gaza onslaught, Israel has carried out frequent attacks in Syria. The regime's air raids have killed Iranian military advisors who had been deployed to Syria at the invitation of the Arab country to help it fight terror groups such as Daesh.

Several Iranian military advisors including a top commander were assassinated after an Israeli strike demolished Iran's consulate in Damascus on April 1st.

Two weeks later, Iran launched a salvo of more than 300 drones and missiles at Israel in retaliation for the Israeli bombing. The Islamic Revolution Guard Corps (IRGC) dubbed the operation "True Prom-

The Iranian large salvo transformed geopolitics in West Asia.

Israeli miscalculations

Following Iran's reprisal strike, multiple American officials asserted that the Israelis had badly miscalculated, thinking that Tehran would not react strongly, that's according to The New York Times.

"After it became clear that Iran would retaliate, U.S. and Israeli officials initially thought the scale of the response would be fairly limited, before scrambling to revise their assessment again and again,"

the American newspaper reported.

Former Israeli air defense commander Brigadier General Zvika Haimovich also acknowledged that Iran is a "superpower in tactical ballistic missiles and UAVs."

His comments are reminiscent of a similar admission made by former U.S. Central Command chief Kenneth McKenzie

In an April 2021 testimony before the Senate Armed Services Committee, McKenzie said the U.S. is "operating without complete air superiority" for the first time since the Korean War because of Iran's drone capabilities.

Israel vulnerability

Former veteran American diplomat Chas Freeman, who served as the U.S. ambassador to Saudi Arabia (1989-92), said Iran carefully hit Israeli military targets during its drone and missile attacks.

"It appears that in a major base in the south, where they struck, they were able to achieve a level of accuracy that was quite extraordinary,"

Freeman, now a senior fellow at Brown University's Watson Institute for International and Public Affairs, added that Israelis lie about the damage caused by the Iranian

"What they showed was they had the capacity to clog and render Israeli defenses overburden. Thev now know where all the radars and missile sites are," he added.

The retired U.S. diplomat noted that Iran's drone and missile attacks have exposed Israel's vulnerability.

"Iran succeeded in panicking

the Israeli population....it can overwhelm Israel's defenses if it chooses to do so and Israel cannot defend itself without the active participation of the United States, the UK,

France and in this case Jordan," he

Freeman added, "From a strategic point of view, from a soft power point of view, it was a huge success; Iran accomplished its objectives and it left Israel with an intolerable dilemma. Israel cannot continue to behave as though it can act with impunity."

If Israel now assassinates an Iranian, Tehran will retaliate in kind, Freeman said

He pointed out that Iran has achieved the neutralization of the American forces in the Persian Gulf that it long sought in the wake of the attacks on Israel.

The humanitarian aid is supposedly meant for

Yet the package includes a ban on any funds for the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees (UNRWA), the UN body that handles the majority of humanitarian assistance

With UNRWA forbidden from any U.S. funds, it is widely believed the Israeli occupation will continue to control whatever supplies can enter

Last week, UN chief Antonio Guterres warned that Israeli commitments to improve aid access to Gaza have had "limited and sometimes no im-

"To avert imminent famine, and further preventable deaths from disease, we need a quantum leap in humanitarian aid to Palestinians in Gaza," he said.

Famine has taken hold in parts of Gaza, made worse by acute shortages of shelter, medicine and clean water. Almost everyone in the enclave now depends on donated food, as the genocidal Israeli war is in its seventh month.

That hasn't been reflected in the "U.S. bill for Israel", which experts say will encourage Tel Aviv to expand its war crimes in Gaza and open a path for the invasion of Rafah, the last place of refuge where Israeli ground forces have yet to invade.

From page **1** ▶ down whatever you wish, we will still hit our targets with precisions. Indeed. the Nevatim air base from which Israeli planes launched the attack on the Iranian consulate in Damascus and the Israeli intelligence headquarters in the Golan Heights, that conspired in the attack were both successful targets. The strikes were also a test of its enemy's capabilities, testing the extent and size of American intervention and its strategic positioning.

Iran's strikes sent multiple messages in terms of deterrence and options, quantity, magnitude, and type of attack that it launched. Whilst Iranian missiles flew above political institutions, like the Knesset and above populated areas, it sent a message that it will not strike except the locations in which Israel targeted the consulate in a retaliatory manner. Iran proved that it is not like the Israeli occupation entity, it abides by international law in the event of war and does not target those who are considered civilians. In this way, Iran has not warranted an Israeli response and there is no excuse for expansion of the war. At the same, Iran

sent a direct message, that is they can respond in a strong manner if their enemy is stupid enough to escalate. The occupation entity's lack of direct response in mainland Iran is an indication that the entity is in big trouble facing the Islamic Republic.

Iran made it clear from the manner it responded that it seeks a limited operation, consolidating the deterrence factor that it wishes to impose. The limits of the Iranian response were that it ought not to be strong enough to invoke a regional war such that America feels the need to get involved, since the goal from Iran's perspective is to halt the Israeli war on Gaza. Iran considers this the greater victory because the war would have ended with the Gazan resistance standing strong, and Israel not having achieved a single military strategic objective.

The Iranian response is based on the strategy that Gaza must remain the focal point. To turn it into a regional conflict is to give the Israeli occupation entity what it wants, as that would free its hand in Gaza, with the world distracted away from their mass genocide. This would also facilitate Israel's only plan for Gaza: to create unbearable con-

ditions and to get rid of Gaza altogether. The Iranian retaliatory strike has already created a much better ground and atmosphere for Palestinian negotiations and has strengthened their position.

According to a report by Bloomberg on April 15, Amos Yaldin, a former director of Israeli military intelligence, the Iranian attack may lead to a strategic change in "the war in Gaza and even its end."

Israeli sources also told CNN on April 15 that Israel was set to take its first steps towards a ground offensive on the city of Rafah but delayed it after Iran launched a retaliatory attack on military and intelligence targets in Israel on April 13.

America is taking Iran very seriously, avoiding confrontation and applying pressure on the Israeli occupation entity to come to its terms. There is more desperation to end the war altogether, as its consequences are becoming uncontrollable. The occupation entity's situation has become fragile, and this inevitably facilitates a ceasefire and an end to the war on Gaza.

Mass grave found at hospital in Gaza's **Khan Younis**

Palestinian civil defense crews have uncovered a mass grave inside the Nasser Medical Complex in Gaza's Khan Younis.

More than 200 bodies have been recovered as Israel has continued bombardment of the devastated coastal enclave for more than six months, Al Jazeera reported.

The discovery on Saturday, and continuing into Sunday, comes after the Israeli military withdrew its troops from the southern city on April 7. Much of Khan Younis is now in ruins after months of relentless Israeli bombardment and heavy fighting.

Earlier, a mass grave was discovered at al-Shifa Hospital following a two-week siege. It was one of several mass graves found at al-Shifa the largest medical facility in the coastal enclave.

Israel's war on Gaza has killed more than 34,000 Palestinians, according to local health officials, devastated Gaza's two largest cities and left a swath of destruction across the territory.

At least two-thirds of the casualties are children and women.

Hamas warns against Rafah onslaught

Hamas Political Bureau Chief Ismail Haniyeh has said tens of thousands of people in the Gaza Strip have been killed by using US weapons, adding that Washington's veto against the establishment of a Palestinian state at the United Nations Security Council (UNSC) effectively provides political protection for Tel Aviv's actions.

In an exclusive interview with Anadolu, he added that the U.S. veto of full UN membership for Palestine shows that Washington has embraced the Israeli position and opposes the rights of the Palestinian people.

Haniyeh warned against a possible military operation by the Israeli army in Rafah and said that it could lead to a massacre against the Palestinian people.

Regarding the resistance of the Palestinian people, Haniyeh said, "If the Zionist enemy enters into Rafah, Palestinian people will not raise the white flag. The resistance fighters in Rafah are ready to defend themselves and resist attacks."

Israeli minister seeks sanctions against PA

Israel's far-right National Security Minister Itamar Ben-Gvir demanded the imposition of "immediate sanctions" against the Palestinian Authority in response to "the Biden administration's political decision" to blacklist the Israeli military's Netzar Yehuda battalion.

The army unit stationed in the occupied West Bank has been accused of human rights abuses by officials in the U.S. State Department, Al Jazeera reported.

Ben-Gvir called on Prime Minister Netanyahu to sanction the PA, confiscate its funds, and formulate "a series of severe sanctions against the Palestinian banks".

Calling Ukraine the anti-Russian "private military company," the diplomat said that now it "will function a little longer, more money will be pocketed, more weapons stolen, and tens of thousands of Ukrainians will go to meat grinder." "But the inglorious end of the Kiev regime is inevitable, regardless of this new package and all the futile efforts of its U.S. and NATO backers to keep it alive." he stressed.

China: AUKUS risks nuclear proliferation in Pacific

China's foreign minister has accused Western powers in the AUKUS security pact of provoking division and risking nuclear proliferation in the South Pacific.

On a weekend visit to strengthen Beijing's ties with Papua New Guinea, Foreign Minister Wang Yi lashed out at AUKUS, which provides for the United States and Britain to equip Australia with nuclear-powered but conventionally armed submarines, The Arab News reported.

The three-way AUKUS agreement "runs counter" to a South Pacific treaty banning nuclear weapons in the region, he told a news conference in Port Moresby.

AUKUS also "raises serious nuclear proliferation risks," the Chinese foreign minister told reporters after meeting with his Papua New Guinea counterpart Justin Tkatchenko.

Rights group seeks probe into role of tech firms in killings Gazans

A human rights group has said that the role of major technology companies and international social media platforms in the killing of Palestinian civilians in Gaza must be investigated.

'These companies need to be held accountable if found to be complicit or not to have taken adequate precautions to prevent access to, and exploitation of, users' information," the Euro-Med Human Rights Monitor said.

There are frequent reports that Israel uses a number of artificial intelligence-supported technological systems to illegally track and monitor Palestinians, the group said.

"Google and Israel are collaborating on several technology initiatives, including Project Nimbus, which provides the Israeli army with tools for the increased monitoring and illegal data collection of Palestinians, thereby broadening Israeli policies of denial and persecution, plus other crimes against the Palestinian people."

Research center identifies accessibility challenges for middle and lower classes

TEHRAN - The Research Center of the Iranian Parliament has reported that a significant portion of the middle and lower classes of society, as well as the disabled and elderly, have been deprived of the benefits of tourism due to the lack of infrastructure and supportive policies.

The center's studies also indicate that policymaking in the field of domestic tourism development has been unsuccessful in recent decades, and tourism is not a quality and accessible product for the general public, ISNA reported.

Even increasing the number of domestic trips through strengthening the pattern of unplanned tourism, reliance on private cars, and based on staying at the homes of relatives and friends has not provided the expected functions of domestic tourism for Iranian households.

The Parliament Research Center, by examining the status of quantitative and qualitative indicators of domestic tourism, has concluded that there is a serious issue in the possibility of benefiting from the advantages of tourism among the middle and lower classes and disabled and elderly individuals in society.

It explained that between 2001 and 2021, in terms of quantity (except during the limited days of the coronavirus pandemic), domestic tourism in Iran has been on the rise. "However, statistics show a shrinking share of travel and recreation from the expenditure basket of Iranian families."

According to the research center, the quantity of trips has been affected by factors such as repeated trips by affluent households or an increase in mandatory trips, and this has not led to qualitative development in this area.

One notable issue is the uneven spatial and temporal distribution of domestic trips across



the country, with more than 50% of trips occurring in less than 20% of the country's provinces, mainly during the Nowruz holidays and a few crowded holiday periods. Moreover, most of these trips are made by private cars (77%) and based on staying at the homes of relatives and acquaintances (76%).

Moreover, the research center revealed that domestic tourism in Iran has faced the decision of households to economize on initial travel expenses, and economic issues have also increased the tendency of domestic travelers towards unplanned and car-dependent trips, and there is a significant gap between the number of households that have traveled and those that have not in the statistics related to households without private cars.

"In fact, private cars play a significant role in the distribution of travel in Iranian households, and accessibility to a private car is decisive for access to domestic tourism."

A way to reduce travel expenses and benefit from discounts is to conduct group trips or recommended tours, while the overall tendency towards these types of trips does not show a growing trend according to the Parliament Research Center's investigation.

The Islamic Republic expects to reap a bonanza from its numerous tourist spots such as bazaars, museums, mosques, bridges, bathhouses, madrasas, mausoleums, churches, towers, and mansions, of which 27 are inscribed on the UNESCO World Heritage list.

Persepolis director underscores fight against lichens

TEHRAN - Research and field investigation for combating lichens is still underway on the stones in Persepolis, a celebrated World Heritage site in southern Iran, the World Heritage site's director said on Sunday.

"Moreover, documentation of the location of the lichens is ongoing," Alireza Askari-Chaverdi said.

"Lichens are one of the most damaging factors to historical buildings, especially stone monuments. The operation of cleaning lichen in Persepolis is carried out in workshop format by a team of conservation and restoration experts and continues to this day."

Referring to news circulating on social media under the title "Persepolis infested with lichens," Askari-Chaverdi stated: Lichens are one of the most damaging factors to historical buildings, especially stone monuments. This problem is less prevalent in Iran and much more prevalent in stone structures in European countries, especially Italy.

The expert stated that lichens come in many different types, adding:" According to biologists, lichens are formed by a close association of fungi and algae. In this symbiosis, algae produce organic materials through photosynthesis, consumed by fungi, and on the other hand, fungi dissolve mineral materials in the stone through acid secretion, consumed by algae.

He continued: Although not all experts agree with this theory, all experts, including cultural heritage specialists and biologists, believe that lichen growth can damage stones.



"Due to the diversity of lichens, a definitive and uniform treatment has not yet been presented. Different countries propose different solutions for their cleaning, and although some appropriate methods have been used, there are also criticisms of them."

In the past, experimental conservators used water and brush to clean lichens, which is the easiest method but has many disadvantages, including the spread of lichens, not removing the roots of lichens, and the emergence of new types of lichens, he explained.

Askari-Chaverdi stated that laboratories in Persepolis have been conducting extensive studies on the types and methods of lichen cleaning for the past 17 years in collaboration with international and Iranian specialized centers and these studies are still ongoing.

He emphasized that it can be said that Persepolis was the first Iranian site where lichens were subjected to specialized examinations and the first place where scientific treatment of lichens was conducted, and a significant number of these damaging fac-

tors have been removed from the surface of stone artifacts.

In 2001, only a part of the site was experimented on by Iranian-Italian conservation and archaeology teams, and in this project, Iranian experts and experts from the University of Bologna and some other institutions participated, he said.

"After positive results from the use of a type of lichen remover were obtained, in 2019, two palaces at Persepolis were cleaned of lichens and stone artifacts were restored by borderless conservators in collaboration with Iranian experts."

He noted that an Iranian-Italian archaeological and conservation team conducted experiments on one of the undecorated walls at Persepolis to be re-examined after several years. The important point is that lichen cleaning and its growth are very complex, and to see the results of cleaning, a multi-year period is required.

"For example, lichen removal materials may have been found useful in Italy, but may not be suitable in Iran due to the type of lichen, the type of stone, and the suitable climatic conditions.

Therefore, drug use cannot be done without continuous and specialized studies. For this reason, experts and the management of Persepolis use any lichen removal material based on its useful records in Persepolis."

Furthermore, Askari-Chaverdi emphasized that usually lichen cleaning should be accompanied by protective and restoration measures, and it is necessary to define a conservation workshop for each section for protective and restoration measures to be taken after lichen cleaning; otherwise, lichen cleaning may not only be positive but also harmful to historical artifacts.

He underlined the existence of lichens and fungi on stone artifacts is not a new or strange subject and said: Wherever there is stone, there is likely to be lichen. This issue has been the subject of research and practical actions during the history of the conservation and restoration of the Persepolis collection and practical and effective measures have been taken."

"During the past two years, monitoring of lichen removal operations with new methods of lichen control has been carried out by conservation experts on site. Despite the benefits of this method, it cannot be considered the definitive way to save inscriptions and artifacts in order to remain safe from destruction caused by lichens"

For this reason, the importance of research, complementary, and analytical studies resulting from previous studies to achieve newer and more effective methods is underway, he concluded.

Thousands protest against over-tourism in Spain's Canary Islands

Tens of thousands of demonstrators have hit the streets of Spain's Canary Islands to demand changes to the model of mass tourism they say is overwhelming the Atlantic archipelago.

An estimated 57,000 people joined the protests, which began at midday (11:00 GMT) on Saturday, Spanish media reports said, citing the central government's representative in the

Flag-waving crowds packed the streets of the main towns across all of the archipelago's seven islands, chanting and whistling, and holding placards with slogans like: "The Canary Islands are not up for sale!"; "A moratorium on tourism"; and "Respect my home".

"It's not a message against the tourist, but against a tourism model that doesn't benefit this land and needs to be changed," one of

the protesters told the Reuters news agency during the march in Tenerife's capital, Santa

Smaller marches were held elsewhere in the island group and other Spanish cities, all of them organized by about two dozen environmental organizations ahead of the peak summer holiday season.

The protests were called by some 20 social and environmental groups who say tourist overcrowding perpetuates an economic model that harms local residents and damages the anvironment.

They want the authorities to limit the number of visitors and have proposed introducing an eco-tax to protect the environment, a moratorium on tourism and a clampdown on the sale of properties to non-residents.

Coins, other relics recovered in Maragheh

TEHRAN – East Azarbaijan's authorities have recovered hundreds of historical metal coins along with some other relics from a private residence in the village of Gol Tapeh.

As revealed by the provincial police commander in charge of protecting cultural heritage, during an inspection by law enforcement at a private house in the village of Goltappeh, some historical objects along with hundreds of coins were discovered.

Gholamreza Zeinali revealed on Sunday, that immediately after the discovery, the protection unit officers arrived at the scene and upon further investigation, uncovered various historical items including a ceramic statue, an

ancient metal statue, and a decorative plaster inscription.

"Also, 1,760 historical metal coins were discovered and confiscated," the commander noted.

The official further explained that all the relics were collected for legal processing by judicial authorities.

The artifacts will undergo further analysis and preservation efforts to ensure their historical significance is properly documented and protected, the commander said.

Soaked in history and culture for millennia, Tabriz, the capital of East Azarbaijan, embraces several historical and religious sites, including the Jameh Mosque of Tabriz and Arg of Tabriz.

and UNESCO-registered Tabriz Historic Bazaar Complex to name a few. The city became the capital of the Mongol Il-Khan Mahmud Gazan (1295–1304) and his successor. Timur (Tamerlane), a Turkic conqueror, took it in 1392. Some decades later, the Kara Koyunlu Turkmen made it their capital. It was when the famous Blue Mosque was built in Tabriz.

The city retained its administrative status under the Safavid dynasty until 1548 when Shah Tahmasp I relocated his capital westward to Qazvin. Rhubarb Festival celebrates Kuhsorkh's local products, crafts

TEHRAN – In a celebration of the Kuhsorkh's vast array of local plant products, the fourth edition of the Rhubarb Festival has delighted hundreds of attendees.

The one-day event, taking place on the last Friday of the very first month of the Persian calendar [April 19], was participated by indigenous peoples in Kuhsorkh's Riyush [believed to be driven from 'Rivas', which is a Persian word for Rhubarb].

Attending the festival, Khorasan Razavi's director-general of Cultural Heritage, Tourism, and Handicrafts announced that the event is considered a way to appreciate the local farmers and artisans' efforts, showcasing the outstanding outputs.

The festival is routinely attended by some provincial officials to honor local farmers and showcase the various products coming from the country, Seyyed-Javad Mousavi noted.

"Our strategy to develop tourism in Kuhsorkh is based on its capacities in agricultural tourism, rural tourism, and ecotourism," the director-general noted, "the existing six eco-lodges and guest houses are a testament to the ongoing growth in this sector."

He also highlighted the significant role of local crafts in the tourism sector, noting that workshops in various traditional crafts have thrived, creating around 40 new jobs within the county.

AI to help improve waste management

TEHRAN -The Department of Environment (DOE) aims to use artificial intelligence (AI) in waste management through a specifically defined project, an official with DOE

Referring to the fact that plastic accounts for a large amount of waste, Mehdi Khadem-Sameni said the ministry of industry is responsible for supervising the implementation of waste management law and the distribution of plastic bags, but the results have not been satisfying so far, IRNA reported.

He made the remarks on the occasion of Clean Earth Week.

The National Clean Earth Week will start on April 22 with the theme of "Investing in land, developing recycling and green productivity."

The event will put the emphasis on reducing the use of plastic bags across the country.

The Department of Environment plans to enforce the law that ban plastic bag distribution on Clean Earth Week, the official added.

There are five types of waste, including, urban, rural, agricultural, medical, and industrial waste. Particular industrial and medical waste demand additional measures, Khadem-Sameni added

The DOE has compiled and approved the standard of biodegradable bags as part of regulations to



reduce plastic bags consumption, he

Many countries including Pakistan and Bangladesh have already implemented bans on plastic bag distribu-

Failing to observe the law will result in legal actions to be taken.

Considering the high volume of waste produced in the country and its adverse effects on human health and the environment, it seems that the revision of waste management is very crucial.

Within the past Iranian calendar year, March 2023 - March 2024, a total of 5,117 tons were produced per day in Tehran with 200 to 250 tons known to be medical waste, and some 828 cases were industrial

Improper disposal costs environment \$1.7b annually

Improper management of waste in the country causes 870 trillion rials (some \$1.7 billion) in damage to the environment and natural resources every year, an official with the Department of Environment (DOE) has said.

Converting waste into fertilizer and energy, using standard waste incinerators, and modern methods such as digesters and pyrolysis are among the known strategies used in the world for handling waste, but these methods do not exist in the country, he added.

The current methods used in the country for waste management are old, the official noted, regretting that up to 80 percent of the waste that can be recycled to be used for different purposes is discarded.

"Out of around 600 waste management centers across the country, just four to five are standardized. In other words, some 96 percent of the waste is just dumped in landfills."

According to World Bank, the pollution of resources in 2004 incurred a loss of about 8 billion dollars to the country, and the figure rose to about 10 billion dollars in 2009.

Developing AI infrastructure

By allocating 50 trillion rials (some \$100 million), the public and the private sector will develop the infrastructure for artificial intelligence operators in the current calendar year, which started on March

The importance of artificial intelligence cannot be denied. However, it's hard to keep pace with the rapid [global] growth in the area, Rouhollah Dehqani-Firouzabadi, the vice president for science and technology, said, IRNA

He made the remarks while attending the first meeting of the national steering committee's working group on artificial intelligence.

The main objective behind founding the national steering committee is to promote and develop AI in the country with the help of both the private sector and the public sector, he

Prenatal screening for SMA to kick off

TEHRAN -The ministry of health has announced that spinal muscular atrophy (SMA) screening will be launched in the current Iranian year which started March 20.

SMA is a disease that robs people of physical strength by affecting the motor nerve cells in the spinal cord, taking away the ability to walk, eat, or breathe.

It is the number one genetic cause of death for infants. It affects approximately 1 in 11,000 births, affecting any race or gender.

The plan aims to prevent the birth of children with SMA, IRNA quoted Hossein Farshidi, an official with the Health Ministry, as saying.

Three groups will be screened for SMA including the public, those who have married their relatives (consanguineous marriage), and parents of children with SMA.

A domestically developed diagnostic kit will be used for screening SMA.

SMA treatment

Currently, more than 600 people in Iran, most of whom are children, are suffering from

Nusinersen with the brand name SPINRA-ZA is the first medication for the treatment of SMA that was approved by international organizations in 2016 to treat the disorder and is now used in more than 50 countries.

In August 2023, the Iranian Red Crescent Society (IRCS) announced that the second shipment of SPINRAZA medicine which is used for the treatment of spinal muscular atrophy patients arrived in the country.

In August 2022, the first shipment of Evrysdi, an oral medication used to treat SMA, was imported to the country, said Saeed Azamian, CEO of the SMA Association of Iran.



Risdiplam, sold under the brand name Evrysdi, is the first oral medication approved to treat the disease.

The U.S. sanctions, preserved under the Joe Biden administration, have restricted the financial channels necessary to pay for basic goods and medicine, undermining supply chains by limiting the number of suppliers willing to facilitate sales of humanitarian goods to the country

442 rare diseases identified in Iran

A total of 442 rare diseases have been identified in the country according to a recent report by the Rare Disease Foundation.

The incidence of rare diseases is very low to the extent that maybe one or two people with a certain rare disease are present in the country. Some rare diseases such as 'butterfly skin or EB', 'Spinal muscular atrophy (SMA)', 'Metabolic diseases', 'Autism', and 'Dystrophies' are among the most common cases in the country. A sum of 50 trillion rials (about \$100 million) was allocated in the past Iranian calendar year that ended on March 20, 2023, IRNA reported, adding that the figure rose to 70 trillion rials

Considering the number of patients identified, the needed medicines, and medical tools, a sum of 150 to 180 thousand trillion (about \$300 million) is expected to be allocated for the current Iranian calendar year, beginning on March 21.

National health literacy movement to be implemented

TEHRAN - The national health literacy movement will be implemented in 10 provinces of the country in line with the theme of the second day of the national health week, an official with the health ministry's Persian medicine office has said.

It's a specialized program that aims to promote health and a healthy lifestyle and will involve multilateral interaction between the ministries of health and education, IRNA quoted Hossein Rezaei-zadeh as saying.

The initiative will start at schools targeting teachers, students (from first to sixth grade), and their parents.

Using graphic techniques and educational principles tailored for children, the program seeks to convey simple, practical messages about healthy lifestyles in the form of stories.

Health literacy and skills for maintaining a healthy lifestyle are among the most important elements for fostering health and wellbeing within families and society.

In the first phase of the program, a total of 300,000 students will learn about health, healthy nutrition, and lifestyle to improve family health.

IJBD ranking rises from Q4 to Q3

TEHRAN -According to the recent ranking published by SCImago, the ranking of the Iranian Journal of Breast Diseases (IJBD) has improved from Q4 to Q3.

In addition to the Impact Factor or Impact Index, rankings of journals in each subject category are divided into quartiles by both Journal Citation Report (JCR) and SCImago Journal and Country Rank (SJR)

These quartiles rank the journals from highest to lowest based on their impact factor or impact index.

There are four quartiles: Q1, Q2, Q3 and Q4.

Q1 is occupied by the top 25% of journals in the list; Q2 is occupied by journals in the 25 to 50% group; Q3 is occupied by journals in the 50 to 75% group and Q4 is occupied by journals in the 75 to 100% group.

The journal considers articles for publishing on all aspects of breast cancer research including prevention, diagnosis, treatment,

and rehabilitation of breast diseases in basic sciences, clinical trials, health sciences, social sciences, and medical engineering.

The Iranian Journal of Breast Diseases is indexed in Scopus, Islamic World Science Citation Center (ISC), Scientific Information Database (SID), Magiran, and CIVILICA Database.

Measuring Scientific activity

There are several different metrics that are used to measure and evaluate the quality of scientific publications.

Scientific production is measured and evaluated based on a series of criteria relating to the quantity of works published and the number of times that these works have been cited. Among these criteria it is helpful to highlight the number of works published; the total number of citations received; the average number of citations per work published; the number of significant works published; and the number of citations received by the most frequently-cited works.

Iran capable of manufacturing any medicine in two years

Iranian pharmaceutical industry and scientists are capable of producing any kind of medicine over a two-year period, Mohammad Reza Shanehsaz, head of Food and Drug Administration, has said.

Some medicines are not currently manufactured domestically as their production is not economically justifiable because of low consumption, he added, IRNA reported.

In some cases, medicines are new pharmaceutical molecules that

have recently been produced worldwide, he noted. "The U.S. has sanctioned medicine as far as possible, but we have

been able to provide patients with the required medicine, and currently there is no shortages," he explained.

Authors withdraw from PEN America Literary Awards in protest against stance on Gaza

Thirty authors and translators have signed an open letter to PEN America in which they declined, or withdrew their work from consideration for, the organization's 2024 Literary Awards, in protest against its "failure to confront the genocide of the Palestinian people and defend our fellow writers in Gaza."

In the letter, sent to the board of trustees this week, the writers said they "wholeheartedly reject PEN America and its failure to confront the genocide in Gaza" and demanded the resignations of the organization's CEO, Suzanne Nossel, its president, Jennifer Finney Boylan, and its entire executive committee, Arab News reported.

The signatories include the co-founder of the PEN World Voices Festival, Esther Allen, as well as Joseph Earl Thomas, Kelly X. Hui, Nick Mandernach, Alejandro Varela, Maya Binyam and Julia Sanches.

Allen this month said she had declined the PEN/Ralph Manheim Award for Translation. She posted a message on social media platform X on April 5 in which she said she had done so in solidarity with more than 1,300 writers who had criticized PEN America for its silence "on the genocidal murder of Palestinians," and "in

celebration and memory of, and in mourning for, all the Palestinians silenced forever by USbacked Israeli forces.'

Similarly, Binyam recently withdrew her debut novel "Hangman" from consideration for the PEN/Jean Stein and PEN/Hemingway

In an email to PEN America, a copy of which she posted on X on April 11, she said she considered it "shameful that this recognition (of her work) should exist under the banner of PEN America, whose leadership has been steadfast in its dismissal of the ongoing genocide, and of the historic struggle for Palestinian liberation."

In their open letter this week, the signatories said: "Writers have a responsibility to be good stewards of history in order to be good stewards of our communities."

They added that they "stand in solidarity with a free Palestine," and refuse "to be honored by an organization that acts as a cultural front for American imperialism" or "take part in celebrations that will serve to overshadow PEN's complicity in normalizing genocide."

In response, PEN America said: "Words matter and this letter deserves close scrutiny for its alarming language and characterizations. The current war in Gaza is horrific. But we cannot agree that the answer to its wrenching dilemmas and consequences lies in a shutting down of conversation and the closing down of viewpoints. We respect all writers for acting out of their consciences and will continue in our mission to defend their freedom to express themselves."

The awards are due to be handed out during a ceremony on April 29 in Manhattan.

At least 34,000 Palestinians have been killed and about 77,000 wounded in Israeli attacks on Gaza since October 7. Moreover, 1.7 million (75 percent of Gaza residents) have been displaced.

According to the UN experts, between 60 and 70 percent of all homes in Gaza, and up to 84 percent of homes in northern Gaza, are either fully destroyed or partly damaged. The World Bank, UN and EU estimate that damage to the Strip thus far is \$18.5 billion or 97 percent of the total GDP of Gaza and West Bank. A staggering 72 percent of this estimate is the cost of housing, while another 19 percent is the cost of civilian infrastructure, including water and sanitation, power and roads.
